DESCRIPTION

Explores uses of the Internet to enhance classroom learning, including face-to-face, on-line, and blended (live + Internet) classes. The focus is on the 4 C's of using the Internet for instruction: Content, Communication, Collaboration, and Community. Also explores informal learning communities outside of classroom settings, including professional development.

Class participation includes between-class activities using the Internet. A functioning SIU e-mail account is required and is the responsibility of the student to maintain and check regularly.

TOPICAL OUTLINE

Content: Use of Internet for research, WebQuest creation30% Communication: Use of e-mail, listsery, BLOG, forum10% Collaboration: Use of WIKI, forum, formative evaluation30% Community: Use of forum in formal and informal settings.... 30%

OBJECTIVES

Students will be able to:

- Use the Internet to research topics, including video.
- Know ethical and technical aspects of repurposing Internet content, including Fair Use standards.
- Create WebQuests and Web-U-Torials (WebQuest for adult learners) to direct Internet research by students.
- Locate, evaluate, and integrate free/low-cost multimedia programs including drills, games, and simulations.
- Use BLOG format for instructional purposes.
- Use WIKI for collaborative content creation.
- Manage electronic discussion forum for class discussion.
- Use discussion forums for professional development.
- Use social networking and bookmarking for learning activities and professional development.
- Learn about other Web 2.0 applications as they appear.

TEXT

The instructor will assign required readings. Postings on the ci482 class forum, by the instructor and by students, are considered to be required reading. The students in ci482 will generate a substantial amount of the course content. Pop quizzes are always possible.

ASSIGNMENTS

Late assignments will be lowered by at least ten percent. Late penalty may be more depending on circumstances.

The class forum is hosted on a COEHS server. However, no Internet communication can be considered private. All forum comments should be considered public and forums will be made available for academic research. Student participation in the class forum is considered to be consent to public view of the forum, both during and after the course. Students with privacy concerns are advised to take precautions to disguise their identity.

PROJECTS

Any project developed during he course becomes the intellectual property of the Collaboratory for Interactive Learning Research (CILR lab) and the Department of Curriculum and Instruction. CILR Lab and the department reserve the right to later release the projects under the "Creative Commons" agreement or to develop and commercialize projects. Students who attend more than three class sessions are considered to have consented to the stipulated "intellectual property" requirements.
